"I need solitude, which is to say, recovery, return to myself, the breath of a free, light, playful air"

The theme of our 2022 AWE Festival is Solitude & Togetherness and the crucial role they play in the creative process. As usual, all of our programmes are thematically interlinked, paying particular attention to the relationships between artists and how they inspire one another.

The concept of 'Solitude' inspires many different feelings and definitions, depending on your perspective. Almost certainly, it is something most of us will have experienced over the past two challenging years with Covid-19. While loneliness may be the first facet of solitude that comes to mind, our programme also examines some of its other aspects: what solitude can provoke and inspire in each of us, how solitude develops relationships between individuals, and the power of communication that can lead to us feeling connected, or apart from, one another.

Our Solitude & Togetherness theme can also be broken down further into three key threads: Nietzsche, Frei Aber Einsam, and this year's Composer in Residence, Gareth Farr. As a way of connecting with these focal points, we have assigned waypoints, or key ideas, to each concert. These act as guiding steps along the journey, helping you explore the different emotions woven into each programme's musical works. We look forward to guiding our audience through the Festival, and we hope these waypoints may contribute some extra food for thought as our listeners experience this powerful music.

The Three Threads

- Friedrich Nietzsche

Nietzsche

Friedrich Nietzsche, the philosopher, was one of the first to advocate for the necessity of solitude in society, and particularly in the creative process. What may seem like simple truths to us now, was a breath of fresh air to many. This idea inspired many artists at the time, including Strauss, Mahler,

and particularly Schoenberg; whose enchanting composition Verklarte Nacht is the summit of our 2022 programme. The poem by Richard Dehmel on which it is based tells the story of a man and woman walking through a dark forest on a moonlit night, the latter burdened by a heavy secret.

FAE Frei aber einsam (Free but lonely / alone / solitary)

'Frei aber einsam' was the motto of legendary violinist Joseph Joachim. Joachim adopted this motto at a difficult time in his life, which inspired Schumann, Dietrich and a young Brahms to write the FAE Sonata as a gift. With several appearances in our AWE 2021 programme, Joachim was a hugely connective figure in his lifetime and an integral part of the musical family that included Brahms, Mendelssohn, Schumann, and particularly Clara Schumann née Wieck.

Gareth Farr, AWE 2022 Composer in Residence

Gareth Farr is AWE's Composer in Residence for 2022, with music featuring in every programme of this year's Festival. His colourful and compelling music needs little introduction, having inspired both musicians and audiences alike around the world. This year, the AWE Festival has also commissioned Gareth to compose a new duo for violin and cello, Four Postcards From the Lakes, which will receive its world premiere in Wānaka.

For the first time, we're excited to be offering free community events as part of the AWE Festival, including several open rehearsals and Balinese Gamelan workshops with Gareth. This striking instrument has been a strong influence in Gareth's compositions, especially in his earlier years. Another highlight will be the first live performance of Where Will They Bury My Bones, a powerful work written and premiered by Kiwis across the globe, including Julien van Mellaerts, Benjamin Baker and librettist Paul Horan who will all be converging in Queenstown for this performance. According to Gareth, this work "looks at the way we experience loneliness, distance and disenfranchisement for our natural country and our national life as New Zealanders."

We hope you enjoy the AWE Festival 2022 as much as we've enjoyed putting it together.

Programme

Our Festival Programme begins with the opening movement of Strauss' opera Capriccio, subtitled 'a conversation piece for music'. We are then transported by Gareth Farr's playful Mondo Rondo, one of his most widely performed works with exotic melodies and interlocking rhythms, followed by the contrastingly introspective Five songs for baritone and string quartet by Alma Mahler.

The programme concludes with the last major piece Mendelssohn ever completed, believed to be composed as a homage to his sister Fanny, who died a few months prior.

Programme

Opening with the world premiere of Gareth Farr's conversational Four Postcards From The Lakes, we continue the journey with echoes of Wakatipu, Gareth's piece for solo violin inspired by Lake Wakatipu and its mysterious Māori legend. Next is Dover Beach, Barber's expression of Matthew Arnold's text, which charts a dark exploration of human isolation through loss of faith and the ebb and flow of human misery it brings. We then arrive at Victoria Kelly's Songs without words, dedicated to her daughter Sasha and "the way in which she and I forge understandings without words." Our weekend in Wānaka concludes with Brahms' second String Quartet, teasing the next step of our journey in Queenstown with the notes 'FAE'.

Programme

Nine Seas Away begins with intertwining lines of viola and piano, inspired by the legend of Ngāke and Whātaitai: the two taniwha (water spirits) that created Wellington harbour. Known as the 'father of the string quartet', Joseph Haydn was one of the great innovators of his generation, and the opening of his 29th string guartet inspired it to be nicknamed after a cordial greeting. Following a beautiful selection of Strauss songs, and one by Nietzsche whose greatest love was music itself, we arrive at Gareth Farr's epic work exploring 'the way we experience loneliness, distance and disenfranchisement for our natural country and our national life as New Zealanders'.

This concert will also include a new work by AWE's inaugural Emerging Composer, Eva Bedggood, who was selected from a national competition and mentored by AWE's Mentoring Composer, Salina Fisher.

Programme

Our final programme opens with Ethel Smyth, a fascinating woman, suffragist, and one of the most prominent English musicians of her generation.

Ethel felt a strong sense of belonging to the musical family in Leipzig that included Brahms, Joachim. Mendelssohn and the Schumanns. Following Farr's Octet, a work built around Gareth's two opposing ideas for the piece, an acoustic and stylistic sorbet of Dowland and Josquin brings us to the summit of our 2022 programme. Schoenberg's Verklärte Nacht from 1899 is a work which defines the difficult transition from 19th to 20th centuries, while also depicting a timeless, apprehensive, and heartwrenchingly relatable situation that two lovers consider on a walk together through a dark, moonlit forest.

Described by the New York Times as bringing 'virtuosity, refinement, and youthful exuberance' to his Merkin Concert Hall debut, Benjamin has established a strong international presence as a sought-after soloist and chamber musician.

In addition to winning first prize at the 2016 Young Concert Artists International Auditions in New York, Benjamin also won third prize at the Michael Hill Competition in New Zealand, was a prize winner at the YCAT International Auditions in 2013, and now makes regular appearances at Wigmore Hall and on BBC Radio 3

Recent highlights from his successful career also include his debut with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra at the East Neuk Festival and the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra in New Zealand, as well as performing solo recordings with the BBC Concert and Royal Philharmonic Orchestras and recording for Delphian Records with pianist Daniel Lebhardt.

In addition to his local performances, Benjamin also performed in the Al Bustan Festival in Lebanon, the Sanguine Estate Music Festival in Australia, and toured the USA, Colombia, China, and Argentina.

Benjamin was proud to launch At the World's Edge Festival in 2021 alongside Justine Cormack, as well as making several solo appearances with the Auckland Philharmonia, Fort Worth Symphony, and London Philharmonic Orchestras.

Benjamin plays a 1694 Giovanni Grancino violin, on generous loan from a Charitable Trust.

A staunch advocate for the enormous creativity that exists within the arts community of New Zealand, Justine actively supports and promotes the wealth of creativity bred both internationally, and right here in New Zealand.

A highly sought-after freelance violinist, Justine collaborates broadly as a soloist, chamber musician, guest-concertmaster and orchestral violinist. Through her creative performance coaching business, ListenFeelPlay, Justine supports musicians worldwide, encouraging them to maximise their performance success and optimise their musical enjoyment through insightful mind and body awareness.

From 2002 to mid-2017, as a founding member and violinist of NZTrio, Justine was instrumental in commissioning and performing close to 40 works from

New Zealand composers, proudly showcasing these compositions within the trio's diverse programmes on the national and global stage.

This commitment and passion for promoting New Zealand music saw the trio honoured for outstanding services to New Zealand music with a KBB Music/CANZ citation in 2012, and the Lilburn Trust Citation in 2017.

A highly respected and soughtafter freelance violinist, Wilma Smith is a vital addition to the At the World's Edge Festival. As Second Violinist of the Flinders Quartet, Wilma is also the curator, violinist, and violist of Wilma & Friends, as well as Guest Concertmaster of orchestras throughout Australia and New Zealand and a regular player with the Australian World Orchestra.

Born in Fiji and raised in New Zealand, Wilma studied in the US with the legendary Dorothy DeLay. She was founding first violinist of the Lydian Quartet, winners of the Naumburg Award and prizes at Evian, Banff and Portsmouth International String Quartet Competitions. She worked regularly with the Boston Symphony Orchestra.

Invited by Chamber Music New Zealand to return home to establish the New Zealand String Quartet, Wilma was first violinist until her appointment as concertmaster of the NZSO and later the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra. Since retiring from the MSO, Wilma has prioritised her chamber music roots, enjoying collaborations at home and internationally. Alongside her old friend Victoria Jones, Wilma is Co-Artistic Director of the annual Martinborough Music Festival

Wilma is also Musica Viva's Artistic Director of Competitions, and Chamber Music and Violin teacher at the University of Melbourne Conservatorium of Music and Scotch College.

Wilma plays a 1761 Guadagnini violin and occasionally, a fine Chinese viola.

Marike Kruup is an Estonian violinist currently based in London. A highly-regarded musician with interests and experience in several directions, Marike is an enthusiastic chamber musician and educator. She is a member of the Alkyona String Quartet, who are Tunell Trust and Making Music Artists this season, with performances in the United Kingdom and abroad.

From a family of three generations of teachers, Marike is a keen pedagogue herself, and is closely involved with educational projects in the UK and in NZ through her work as AWE Education Leader

Marike also plays regularly with different orchestras including London Philharmonic Orchestra, City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra and Royal Scottish National Orchestra. As a founding member of the Estonian Festival Orchestra with Paavo Järvi, Marike has also appeared as a soloist with the Estonian National Symphony Orchestra and Tallinn Chamber Orchestra.

Marike's latest achievements include First Prize in both the International "Gianluca Campochiaro" Violin Competition in Italy, and the International Renaissance Violin Competition in Armenia. Her playing described as "alluring" and "passionate" by The New York Times, Amanda Verner is a talented addition to the AWE 2022 team. An experienced orchestral musician, Amanda has served as guest principal of the Sydney, Melbourne and New Zealand Symphony Orchestras, and is currently a member of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra in the role of Acting Principal Viola.

Following her undergraduate study at the Cleveland Institute of Music as a student of Jeffrey Irvine, Amanda received an Artist Diploma from the Curtis Institute of Music, under the tutelage of renowned violists Roberto Diaz, Misha Amory and Michael Tree. In 2013, Amanda gave her solo debut at Carnegie Hall, performing Steve

Mackey's "Ground Swell" as part of the 21st Century American Contemporary Ensemble workshop with John Adams and David Robertson

As a chamber musician, she has performed with Philharmonia Chamber Players, London, collaborated with the Doric String Quartet, and toured for Chamber Music New Zealand with the MELER ensemble. Amanda has toured extensively with the Verbier Chamber Orchestra under the direction of Gábor Takács-Nagy, performed with Sinfonia Grange au lac with Esa-Pekka Salonen and Gustavo Dudamel, Les dissonances, Concertgebouw Kamerorkest and Camerata RCO. She has also attended the Seiji Ozawa International Academy and Aspen Music Festival.

Amanda has toured with the Australian Chamber Orchestra and the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra. She has also held a position with the Philharmonia Orchestra in London.

A two-time recipient for the Arts Award for Emerging Artists of the Canada Council, Robert has performed with various groups at international chamber music festivals in Europe, North America, and Japan. He has had the honour of studying with violists Thomas Riebl and Veronika Hagen at the Universitaet Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, and with Gerald Stanick at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. Robert plays a 1995 John Newton "cut-away" viola.

A passionate performer and accomplished musician,
Maciej joins the At the World's
Edge Festival for 2022 as an internationally celebrated cellist.
Chamber music has taken
Maciej all over the world, with performances in the last year including the Schumann Concerto with the London Mozart Players,
Saint-Saëns Concerto No.1 with the Baltic and Opole Philharmonic Orchestras, and many more.

At just 19 years old, Maciej won 1st Prize and a special award at the Lutoslawski International Cello Competition. He was a Laureate in the Finals of the 2017 Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels, and a prize winner at the 2019 YCAT International Auditions in London.

During the 2021/22 season, Maciej gave solo recitals at Wigmore Hall, Kronberg Festival, the Festspiele Mecklenburg-Vorpommern, Konzerthaus Berlin and Laieszhalle Hamburg, and recently performed the Haydn Concerto in C with the Koszalin Philharmonic and the Dvorřák Concerto with the Polish Chamber Philharmonic Orchestra Sopot. He premieres a new work by Anna Roclawska-Musialczyk in Gdansk, returns as soloist with the Podlasie, Kielce, Kalisz and Zielona Góra Philharmonic Orchestras, and records Penderecki's complete solo cello music. His recording of French music for Delphian Records is due for release in 2022.

London born cellist Ken Ichinose was appointed Associate
Principal Cello of the New
Zealand Symphony Orchestra
in 2014, whilst also pursuing an
accomplished chamber music
career in New Zealand. He is the
cellist in the Ghost Piano Trio and
has performed with the Kiwa
Quartet, New Zealand String
Quartet, Amici Ensemble, and
the contemporary music group
Stroma.

Prior to his move to New Zealand, Ken was a founding member of the Galitzin Quartet, formed at the Royal Academy of Music, London, where he studied with Paul Watkins. The Quartet actively performed for ten years, completing major tours in the UK, Germany, France, Portugal and Holland.

They were first prize winners of the 2007 Charles Hennen Competition in the Netherlands, and received tuition and guidance from the Vermeer, Jerusalem, and Ysaÿe Quartets. During this time, Ken also worked and toured extensively with the Philharmonia Orchestra of The Royal Opera House Covent Garden, and the Academy of Saint Martin-in-the-Fields, among others.

In addition to his local work in New Zealand, Ken helped establish the Glenn Douglas Winter Chamber Music Festival in Florida, which he returns to play in every January.

Sarah's passion for accompanying and chamber music has led to an impressive career as a performer and recording artist. A founding member of NZTrio for 16 years, she now enjoys a wide variety of collaborations with musicians all over Aotearoa.

Sarah has been an official pianist for the Michael Hill International Violin Competition since its inception in 2001, and the Gisborne International Music Competition since 2008. She regularly appears as a freelance player in the APO. In 2014 Sarah recorded Chris Watson's SOUNZ Contemporary Award-winning "sing songs self" for solo piano and orchestra with the NZSO.

An award-winning recording artist, she was named Classical Artist of the Year with violinist Andrew Beer at the 2020 Aotearoa Music Awards, for their CD. "11

Frames". Two of her other works, 'Sway' (NZTrio, 2017) and 'Gung-ho' (2009, with NZSO principal trombonist David Bremner), were also previous winners of the Vodafone NZ Music Award for Best Classical album

A graduate of the University of Canterbury (NZ), Sarah went on to earn both MM and DMA degrees from the Juilliard School (NY). She maintains an active private teaching practice and is on staff at the University of Auckland.

Julien Van Mellaerts

Baritone NZ | UK



New Zealand baritone Julien Van Mellaerts is an exciting addition to the At the World's Edge Festival for 2022. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Julien co-organized and co-curated Whānau: Voices of Aotearoa, far from home. Devised to highlight and raise funds for New Zealand singers unable to return home or return to work, the concert was recorded at London's Royal Albert Hall and broadcast on both YouTube and Radio New Zealand Concert.

Having graduated with the Tagore Gold Medal from the Royal College of Music, Julien won first prize at the Kathleen Ferrier Awards and Wigmore Hall/ Kohn Foundation International Song Competition, the Maureen Forrester and Lieder prize from Concours Musical International de Montreal, and represented NZ in BBC Cardiff Singer of the World 2019.

His debut album 'Songs of Travel and Home' was recently released on Champs Hill to critical acclaim. Recent operatic roles include Figaro in Le nozze di Figaro in Salzburg Mozartwoche, Count Almaviva Le nozze di Figaro Opera Holland Park, Silvio I Pagliacci Israeli Opera, Masetto Don Giovanni Verbier Festival, Duke of Nottingham Roberto Devereux Chelsea Opera Group, Elizabeth Royal Opera House/Royal Ballet. Next season sees his return to the Wigmore Hall, Israeli Opera and New Zealand Opera. In January 2020, Julien was invited to join the staff of the RCM to teach English Song.

Alongside Dylan Peres, Julien also co-curates Opera in Song for Opera Holland Park, closing the traditional gap between opera and song recitals.

AWE 2022 Composer in Residence Gareth Farr



An incredible composer and talented musician, it's our honour to welcome Gareth Farr as Composer in Residence for the AWE Festival 2022. Gareth's works will feature in every festival programme, including a new violin and cello duo written for his official AWE Festival commission. Another recent work, 'Where will they bury my bones?' will also be performed live for the very first time.

There will be a number of opportunities to hear Gareth talk about his works outside of the performances, as well as chances to observe him in rehearsal with the musicians. Gareth will also present a number of open workshops around Balinese Gamelan, a significant compositional influence on his work, providing personal insight into its thrilling interlocking rhythms.

Born in Wellington, New Zealand, Gareth Farr began his studies in composition and percussion at the University of Auckland in 1986. The experience of hearing a visiting gamelan orchestra in 1988 prompted his return to Wellington to attend Victoria University, where its characteristic rhythms and textures rapidly became the hallmarks of his own composition.

Farr continued with postgraduate study in composition and percussion at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York, where his teachers included Samuel Adler and Christopher Rouse.

The inclusion of four of his works at the 1996 NZ International Festival of the Arts kick-started his career as a dedicated freelance composer. Since then, his music has been commissioned for high-profile events including the 50th anniversary of the NZSO, the opening of Te Papa Museum of New Zealand, the 2000 Olympics in Sydney (with the NZSO and Dame Evelyn Glennie), the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, the Rugby World Cup opening ceremony in 2011, and the 2015 Edinburgh International Festival with renowned mezzo soprano Dame Sarah Connolly.

His Piano Concerto was performed and recorded by the BBC Philharmonic, and most recently a CD of his new Cello Concerto has been recorded by cellist Sébastien Hurtaud and the NZSO for international album release.

In 2006 Gareth was awarded the Order of New Zealand Merit, for his services to music and entertainment; in 2010 he was awarded the prestigious NZ Arts Laureate Award; and in 2014 he was awarded the Distinguished Alumni Award from The University of Auckland.

Other works to be performed at the AWE Festival include his solo violin piece Wakatipu, Ngake, and Whātaitai for viola and piano, as well as Shadow of a Hawk, an action packed duo for cello and piano, culminating with his String Octet which will see all the Festival Artist string players on stage at the same time.

The AWE Emerging Artist Pathway aims to nurture exceptional young New Zealand musicians through their early careers, guiding and supporting these talented individuals to become the compelling artists they aspire to be.

This year, four exceptional young New Zealand musicians were invited to join the AWE Emerging Artist Pathway. With side-by-side rehearsals, performance opportunities and coaching from our Festival Artists, these musicians will be challenged to explore their artistry and craft in a whole new realm. Not only will they perform within the festival programmes, our emerging artists will also support our Student Composition Workshop and play for over 2,000 students in the Central Lakes.
