The dimensions of identity

The realms that mould us. The layers that connect us. The dimensions that intertwine to create our sense of identity: this is where the beauty of our humanity lies. Every element weaving into our being offers a glimpse into who we are, a new lens and perspective through which we see the world. This year, our programme explores themes of home, culture and identity, examining new perspectives, unfamiliar dimensions and cultural realms being crossed.

A touch of home

For many of us, our sense of identity is associated with the feeling and definition of home. Likewise, this hugely contributes to the works of this year's composers and musicians, creating a programme that explores the personal and cultural dimensions tied to that feeling.

Fittingly, this begins with Aotearoa's very own Victoria Kelly, AWE 2023 Composer in Residence. A composer of great creativity, curiosity and intellect, Victoria's powerful compositions respond to her own sense of identity. Her works are woven throughout the festival programme, with the final concert revealing Victoria's AWE 2023 commission, *Ensemble*.

As Victoria describes, *Ensemble* reflects on the multiple dimensions of the word. 'This piece is written for an ensemble of people. It also describes the ensemble of universes represented by each musician's instruments, universes that I could perhaps be inhabiting alongside this one. Perhaps a universe in which I can play the violin, the cello, the horn, or maybe even all three.'

A people united

Slipping into a new dimension, our journey takes us to the cultural formation of what we now know as the Czech Republic. This difficult road spanned years of geopolitical challenges, but ultimately united people living in Bohemia, Moravia and Czech Silesia. Despite the uncertainty of this time, music played a powerful role in establishing and preserving Czech national identities.

The key figures in this included Bedřich Smetana, considered the father of Czech music, who became a national symbol through the ever-shifting borders of the 20th century. Antonín Dvorák and Bohuslav Martinů were hugely influenced by Smetana, further defining and immortalising the Czech style and aesthetic. The famously individual thinker Leoš Janáček went in search of his own truth through a rigorous study of speech, collecting thousands of voice recordings and notating them into what he called 'nápěvky mluvy', meaning 'tunelets of speech' or 'speech melody'. These 'windows into the human soul' hugely influenced his String Quartet No.2 'Intimate Letters', a 'manifesto on love' inspired by a passionate correspondence of which more than 700 letters still survive.

A new perspective

Our final thread explores the effect of travelling through different cultural centres, changing surroundings, and our reactions to the transition between different dimensions of consciousness. At the most adventurous end of this spectrum, AWE 2023 features the famously wide influences and interests of Hungarian Composer György Ligeti through his Horn Trio (written in homage to Brahms), and the Chinese American composer Tan Dun, a composer 'swinging and swimming freely among different cultures.'

New and unfamiliar surroundings can have an inspiring and rejuvenating effect on us, and whether we realise it or not, being far from home can't help but influence our perspective of ourselves. This year's closing work is a celebration of just that, with Tchaikovsky's tuneful nostalgia remembering a summer in Florence.

Programme

Sono begins this year's AWE Festival. The programme introduces American composer Samuel Barber, who described being 'ecstatic about getting as far away from home as possible' before settling in Europe and writing his String Quartet. The heartwrenching despair and beauty of his most famous 'adagio' from this string quartet is often attributed to struggles with his own identity.

We hear the first sounds of this year's Composer in Residence, Victoria Kelly, with her deeply expressive and evocative musical language shining through in *Sono* for piano trio. This work explores the cerebral feeling of wanting to be or trying to get back to sleep, with reality lingering in the background and ever reminding us of its presence.

The programme closes with the first sounds of the french horn at AWE and the musical language of Edwin York Bowen, a widely celebrated British composer and musician during his lifetime.

Programme

AWE's first performance in Bannockburn features Victoria Kelly's homage to TVNZ's end-of-day Kiwi animation that once signalled the end of nightly broadcasts on local television. Dedicated to her late mother, 'the emotional landscape tries to evoke that feeling of nostalgia... from a time in life that wasn't weighed down with responsibilities or fears for the future.'

Hommàge also features one of the most unique pieces of AWE 2023's programme, György Ligeti's Trio for violin, horn and piano. A composer known especially for his cross-cultural influences, this piece takes influence from African drumming, the playerpiano music of Conlon Nancarrow, and the piano music of Chopin and Schumann. A composer of extremes, Ligeti deconstructs and reassembles tonality on his own terms, while playfully and meticulously constructing organised chaos.

We come back down to earth with Dvorák's famous Piano Quintet, beginning our journey into the sounds of Czech music.

Programme

AWE's popular music and wine pairing evening returns, featuring an intriguing path through three centuries of Czech music, both Bohemian and Moravian. Heinrich Biber wrote one of the first pieces for solo violin in 1676, leading up to Bohuslav Martinu's explosive *Three Madrigals* for violin and viola in 1947.

Also featured is the NZ Premiere of esteemed British composer Nicola LeFanu's After Farrera for horn, violin and cello. Inspired by a village high in the Catalan Pyrenees, LeFanu took a composing retreat here to write her music. In her own words, 'it is a wonderful location for quiet and solitude, in an expansive landscape that is perhaps reflected in my short trio.' Perhaps no place better reflects this sentiment than the Cloudy Bay Shed itself.

During the evening, Festival Director Justine Cormack will host a lively Q&A with Composer in Residence, Victoria Kelly. Victoria's *Waraki* opens the programme, referring to the dawn chorus, and within that chorus, two individuals whose distinct calls interact to create a new one.

Immemorial

Programme

The turning point of our 2023 programme is marked by *Immemorial*, a programme arc that explores ideas and forms from the past. The evening begins with Arvo Pärt's *Passacaglia*, an ancient musical form, alongside Schnittke's Piano Quintet dedicated to the loss of his mother. Georgina Palmer, AWE 2023 Emerging Composer, presents her new work *Maramataka*, paired with one of Victoria Kelly's very first pieces – one she sent to Schnittke for advice, who was a pivotal influence on her musical language and a figure of inspiration.

The programme approaches its conclusion through Eleanor Alberga's *Shining Gate of Morpheus*, a piece inspired by her fascination with dreams in Greek mythology. Finally, we come full circle and reconnect with the music of Arvo Pärt and his exploration of infinity, an idea explored by looking into a *Mirror in the Mirror (Spiegel im Spiegel)*.

Programme

The penultimate programme of AWE 2023 features two quartets by Dvorák and Smetana, both completed in 1876. The younger Dvorák also played the viola in the private premiere of Smetana's iconic Quartet 'From my Life.'

Smetana, regarded as the founder of Czech national music, wrote this semi-autobiographical string quartet as a series of sketches from periods of his life. The first movement he described as a 'romantically driven sketch of his youth.' The second movement details his love of dance in the form of a polka, while the finale depicts his suffering from tinnitus, and later, deafness.

The final ingredient of this programme is the inventive Tan Dun, a Chinese-American composer who describes himself as 'swinging and swimming freely among different cultures.'

Eight Colors for String Quartet was the first piece written by Tan Dun after moving to New York in 1986. The piece is strongly influenced by the unique sounds of Peking Opera, alongside his first contact with the concentrated, lyrical language of western atonality.

Programme

Opening with the pinnacle of our pathway through the personal and cultural dimensions of identity, Janáček's String Quartet 'Intimate Letters' is a combination of the two. A deeply personal work described as his 'manifesto on love', the work was inspired by a long and spiritual friendship with Kamila Stösslov. Janáček's other muse was his study of 'speech melody', which led to him recording and dictating thousands of 'tunelets of speech' into music. He saw these notes as 'windows into the human soul'.

We then go on to celebrate this year's AWE Commission by Victoria Kelly, our 2023 Composer in Residence. Ensemble for horn, violin and cello explores the dimensions of an 'ensemble', including the many different definitions of the word as found in music, physics and life. She reflects on her childhood journey with various instruments, describing the different sonic universes each exists in while also imagining parallel universes in which she might have been able to play all three. Finally, the AWE Festival comes to a close for 2023, with Tchaikovsky's last piece of chamber music celebrating remembrances of a summer in Florence.



Benjamin Baker

AWE Artistic Director Violin NZ | UK



Described by the New York Times as bringing 'virtuosity, refinement, and youthful exuberance' to his Merkin Concert Hall debut, Benjamin has established a strong presence as a sought-after soloist and chamber musician both internationally and in Aotearoa.

As a recording artist, Benjamin has soloed with the BBC Concert and Royal Philharmonic Orchestras, and recently released two critically acclaimed albums (1942 & 1919: Coda) with pianist Daniel Lebhardt for Delphian Records. In recent seasons, he has also made solo appearances with the Auckland Philharmonia, Charleston, Fort Worth Symphony, Royal Philharmonic and London Philharmonic Orchestras.

In addition to winning first prize at the 2016 Young Concert Artists International Auditions in New York, Benjamin also won third prize at the Michael Hill Competition in New Zealand, was

a prize winner at the YCAT International Auditions in 2013, and now makes regular appearances at Wigmore Hall and on BBC Radio 3.

Recent highlights from his successful career include his debut with the Scottish Chamber Orchestra at the East Neuk Festival and the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra in New Zealand. In addition, Benjamin has also performed at the Al Bustan Festival in Lebanon, the Sanguine Estate Music Festival in Australia, and has toured America, Colombia, China, and Argentina.

Benjamin plays a 1694 Giovanni Grancino violin, on generous loan from a Charitable Trust.

A staunch advocate for creativity within Aotearoa New Zealand's Arts community, Justine actively supports and promotes creative communities both internationally and closer to home. A highly sought-after freelance violinist, Justine collaborates broadly as a soloist, chamber musician, guest concertmaster.

Through her creative performance coaching business, ListenFeelPlay, Justine supports musicians worldwide, encouraging them to maximise their performance success and optimise their musical enjoyment through insightful mind and body awareness.

From 2002 to mid-2017, as a founding member and violinist of NZTrio, Justine performed throughout New Zealand, Australia, Asia, South America, the USA, Europe and Scandinavia. During this time, the group's commitment and passion for promoting the music of Aotearoa saw the commissioning

and performing of close to 40 works from New Zealand composers, proudly showcasing these compositions within the trio's diverse programmes on a national and global stage.

Other career highlights include her role as concertmaster with the Auckland Philharmonia from 2000-2004, and as lecturer in violin at the University of Auckland following the completion of her Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from Stony Brook University, NY, in 2001.

An active recording artist, Justine has soloed with the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra and released duo recordings with pianists Michael Houstoun and Sarah Watkins, in addition to a varied catalogue of award-winning releases with NZTrio.

Nominated by the Barbican as an ECHO Rising Star for the 2021/22 season, Ben Goldscheider has given recitals at major concert halls across Europe, including at the Concertgebouw, Musikverein, Pierre Boulez Saal, Elbphilharmonie, Koln Philharmonie, and Wigmore Hall amongst others.

London born and raised, Ben completed his studies with honours at the Barenboim-Said Academy in Berlin with Radek Baborák in 2020. He soon went on to make his BBC Proms concerto debut in 2022, performing the Ethel Smyth Concerto for violin and horn with Elena Urioste and the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra. Ben has also appeared as a soloist with the Mozarteum Orchestra Salzburg, Aurora Orchestra, Britten Sinfonia.

English Chamber, Royal Philharmonic, London Mozart Players, Lucerne Symphony, Manchester Camerata, Prague Philharmonia and Sinfonie Orchester Berlin. He has also performed with the BBC Symphony Orchestra conducted by Sakari Oramo.

A committed chamber musician, Ben has collaborated with Daniel Barenboim, Martha Argerich, Sergei Babyan, Elena Bashkirova, Sunwook Kim and Michael Volle at the Verbier, Salzburg, Jerusalem, Intonations (Berlin) and Barenboim (Buenos Aires) Festivals, among many others.

Ben is a member of the Boulez Ensemble and has appeared as guest principal with the Staatskapelle Berlin, West-Eastern Divan, English Chamber and Philharmonia Orchestras.

Finland's Vesa-Matti Leppänen is Concertmaster of the NZSO, a position he has held since 2002. Over the last 20 years, Vesa has supported the orchestra to become globally renowned, both leading and soloing for its 2005 and 2010 international tours to Japan and Europe. He has performed several concertos with the NZSO, including works of leading national composers, and has also soloed with all the major orchestras of Aotearoa New Zealand

Internationally, Leppänen has appeared as a soloist, chamber musician and concertmaster in Australia, China, Japan, South Korea, Singapore, Hong Kong, the Philippines and Scandinavia. He has performed as guest concertmaster for the Sydney and Melbourne Symphony Orchestras, Japan Philharmonic, Orchestra Ensemble Kanazawa, Singapore Symphony Orchestra, KBS

Symphony Orchestra, Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra, and Avanti! Chamber Orchestra

Leppänen's career has been marked by a wide range of chamber music projects both in Aotearoa New Zealand and internationally. His most recent and long-term collaborations include contemporary music group Stroma and a piano trio with pianist Diedre Irons and Andrew Joyce, principal cellist of the NZSO.

Leppänen plays a 1755 G.B. Guadagnini violin. This exceptional instrument was made available to him thanks to the wonderful generosity and support of Ainsley Walter, Mark Stewart, and the NZSO Foundation.

Marike Kruup

AWF Education Leader Violin Estonia | UK



Marike Kruup is an accomplished Estonian violinist based in London, known for her captivating performances and dedication to music and music education. Her vibrant artistry and versatility have earned her recognition as a sought-after chamber musician in small and large ensembles around Europe, including as a founding member of the Estonian Festival Orchestra with conductor Paavo Järvi.

Another key part of her musical identity is the Alkyona String Quartet, which Marike joined in 2020. Current String Quartet Fellows at the Royal College of Music in London, the Quartet performs regularly around the UK and the Netherlands. In 2023, the Alkyonas were one of the ensembles in residence at the ANAM Quartetthaus Festival in Melbourne, alongside the Australian and Marmen String Quartets.

Marike's musical journey began in Tallinn under the guidance of Mari Tampere-Bezrodny. Later, she moved to London to further her education at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and the Royal College of Music, completing her studies with Krzysztof Smietana and Radu Blidar.

Beyond her performances, Marike is dedicated to pedagogy and carries on a family legacy of teaching. Since 2019, she has served as a faculty member at the Rachmaninov Music Academy in London, nurturing a talented class of violin students. She actively engages in educational projects to inspire and educate young musicians.

Award-winning JamaicanAmerican violist Jordan Bak has achieved international acclaim as a trailblazing artist, praised for his radiant stage presence, dynamic interpretations and fearless power. Critics have described him as 'an exciting new voice in classical performance' and 'a powerhouse musician, with a strong voice and compelling sound', lauding his 'haunting lyrical grace.'

Bak's enthusiastically-received debut album *IMPULSE* (*Bright Shiny Things*) was released in May 2022, garnering over one million streams on major digital media platforms and featuring new compositions by Tyson Gholston Davis, Toshio Hosokawa, Anne Leilehua Lanzilotti, Quinn Mason, Jeffrey Mumford, and Joan Tower.

Bak has appeared as soloist with orchestras such as the Sarasota Orchestra, London Mozart Players, New York Classical Players, and Lexington Philharmonic among others. As a recitalist and chamber musician, he has performed in such venues as Carnegie Hall, Wigmore Hall, Jordan Hall, Elgar Concert Hall, and Helsinki Musiikkitalo. He is further looking forward to upcoming concerts at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, at the Schleswig-Holstein Music Festival in Germany, and at the Lichfield Festival in England.

As a soloist, Tobias has performed at the Sydney Opera House, the Sydney Domain, Parramatta Park, Sydney City Recital Hall and Sydney Town Hall. Tobias especially enjoys more intimate recitals in smaller venues or private homes, and teaches viola privately in Sydney.

Recent performances include Strauss Don Quixote and the IMS 50th Anniversary Concert at Wigmore Hall.

As a member of the Gould Piano Trios from 2001 to 2018, Alice performed the complete piano trio of Beethoven, Schubert and Dvorák at Wigmore Hall, has commissioned new works from Sir James MacMillan and Mark Simpson, has over 25 album releases and has toured the USA regularly.

Alice has appeared as a guest cellist with numerous groups including the Nash Ensemble, Ensemble 360 and the Endellion, Elias and Heath Quartets. Regular visits to IMS at Prussia Cove provide ongoing inspiration. Alice has benefitted hugely from her association with the Royal Over-Seas League since winning the String Prize in 1996, including a tour of New Zealand in 2011. Future plans include a cycle of Beethoven Sonatas with Viv McLean, and a return visit to Marlboro Festival.

Alice has tutored cello at the RNCM and RCM, and is now based in her home town of Cardiff at the RWCMD, where she was awarded a Fellowship in 2015.
Alice is also a mentor for ChamberStudio. She and her husband, David Adams, founded the Penarth Chamber Music Festival in 2014

Alice plays a cello by Alessandro Gagliano of 1710.

As a member of the Laurentian Quartet for almost a decade, he toured internationally and taught cello at Sarah Lawrence College in New York. During this time he was also a member of the New York Piano Trio

Rolf furthered his studies at Rutgers
University alongside the Pablo Casals
protégé and Beaux Arts Trio cellist,
Bernhard Greenhouse. It was here he
received his doctoral degree in cello.
He has performed with many eminent
artists, such as Menahem Pressler, Anton
Kuerti, Piers Lane, Alexander Longuich,
Tasmin Little, Nobuko Imai, Gervaise
de Peyer and the Tokyo, Prazak, and
Jerusalem Quartets.

Rolf joined the New Zealand String Quartet in May 1994. In 2014 he was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) for his outstanding services to music in New Zealand.

Rolf plays a Francesco Goffriller cello made in Venice in 1705.

Jian Liu

Piano China | NZ



An internationally celebrated concert pianist, chamber musician and educator, Dr Jian Liu has performed and taught throughout Europe, Asia, and North America. His artistry has taken him to some of the world's most prestigious concert halls, including Carnegie Hall and the Lincoln Center.

Jian has released many solo and chamber albums in New Zealand and the US, and his performances have been broadcast by various TV and radio stations including KPHO public radio (USA), CCTV (China), Suisse Romande Radio (Switzerland), Krakow Radio (Poland), Kan Radio (Israel) and Radio New Zealand.

Having premiered and recorded many New Zealand compositions, Jian is also a champion for New Zealand music. In 2022, he collaborated with Shanghai Music Publishing House to edit and

publish two volumes of New Zealand Piano Works, which marked the first publication of New Zealand music in China. The project has been awarded the Creative New Zealand Arts Grant

Jian is currently the Programme Director of Classical Performance and Head of Piano Studies at the New Zealand School of Music Te Kōkī. Jian studied with Professor Jin Zhang and Dr. Caio Pagano. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Yale School of Music, where he was a student and assistant of Professor Claude Frank.

Jack Moyer is a young cellist based in Poneke Wellington. As a talented chamber musician, Jack has toured New Zealand with the Amici Ensemble for Chamber Music New Zealand's 'Another Night in Vienna' tour, and was part of Ravelation, the overall winner of the 2020 NZCT Chamber Music Contest Jack is currently studying with NZSQ cellist Rolf Gjelsten.

Jack attended the Adam Summer School from 2019 - 2023, where he received chamber music coaching from the NZSQ. As an orchestral musician, Jack has enjoyed playing Principal Cello of both the NZSO National Youth Orchestra and the Wellington Youth Orchestra. Jack has played as a casual member of Orchestra Wellington and the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra.

An AWE Emerging Artist since the festival's inaugural opening in 2021, Jack was awarded a ROSI. Pettman Scholarship for Emerging NZ Musicians in 2023, travelling to the UK in August 2023 for lessons, masterclasses and performances, supported by the Royal Over-Seas League in association with AWF.

Otis Prescott-Mason is a Pōneke Wellington born pianist, currently studying piano under Dr. Jian Liu at Wellington's New Zealand School of Music Te Kōkī. Otis has won numerous competitions at a national level, most recently awarded first prize at the Lewis Eady National Piano Competition and the 2022 National Young Performer Awards. In 2020, while still in high school, Otis was awarded first prize at the New Zealand Junior Piano Competition.

Otis enjoys chamber music and was selected to attend the Adam Summer School for Chamber Music from 2021 – 2023. Otis has been invited to perform at the New Zealand International Music Festival and the Whakatipu Music Festival. Through the generous sponsorship of Professor Jack C.

Richards, Otis attended the 2022 Semaine Internationale de Piano in Blonay, Switzerland and returned to play a solo recital in the 2023 festival.

An AWE Emerging Artist since the festival's inaugural opening in 2021, Otis was awarded a ROSL Pettman Scholarship in 2023. This saw him return to Europe in August 2023 for a range of professional development opportunities, supported by the Royal Over-Seas League in association with AWE.

AWE 2023 Composer in Residence Victoria Kelly



Victoria Kelly is an award-winning composer, arranger, musical director and producer. Last year, our festival programme included Victoria's exquisite Songs Without Words for string quartet, and we are thrilled to have her join us this year as Composer in Residence. Victoria has produced music across a wide spectrum of genres including contemporary classical music, popular music, and music for film, television and theatre. She has worked as a musical director and composer for both large-scale events and television programmes.

Highly sought after as a classical composer, Victoria has worked with a wide range of New Zealand musicians and artists, having been commissioned, performed and/or recorded by the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, the Auckland Philharmonia, the New Zealand String Quartet, NZTrio, Stroma, Michael Houstoun and Stephen de Pledge. In 2023, her long-awaited Requiem was premiered by the Auckland Philharmonia with Simon O'Neill and Jayne Tankersley at the Auckland Arts Festival. Recently, she was also awarded the prestigious 2023 SOUNZ Contemporary Award Te Tohu Auaha in collaboration with APRA AMCOS NZ for Requiem.

In the popular music world, she has collaborated with artists including Neil Finn, Tami Neilson, Finn Andrews / The Veils, Don McGlashan, Anika Moa, SJD and Shapeshifter. As a film composer, she has worked with Peter Jackson, Jonathan King and Robert Sarkies, among others.

Damon began playing the cello around 4 years old, developing his skills through the Suzuki Method before later completing intensive studies with baroque specialist James Bush. In 2021, he achieved the NZQA Top Scholar award for the highest NCEA Scholarship Music score in the country.

Damon is studying a conjoint Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Science at The University of Auckland, under James Tennant for his cello studies. He has been the Principal Cello of the AYO since 2021 and plays a fine Carboni cello on generous loan from the Sir Michael Hill Foundation Instrument Bank.

Madeleine Xiao

Madeleine is a passionate chamber musician and collaborative pianist, both coaching and playing alongside different ensembles and instrumentalists. Madeleine's chamber ensemble *Kaha Trio* has been invited to perform around New Zealand.

Madeleine began learning the piano at 5 years old. At 16, she went on to study a Bachelor of Music at the University of Auckland, where she is now a second year student under the tutelage of Rae de Lisle, Bryan Sayer and Katherine Austin.

In 2022, Madeleine won both the University of Auckland Concerto Competition and the Auckland Youth Orchestra Piano Concerto Competition. AWE Emerging Composer



Each year, an AWE Emerging Composer is selected through a nationwide competition for composers 20 years and vounger. Over a five-month period, they receive personalised composition mentoring from the AWE Mentoring Composer and are supported to create a new work, which will then be performed within the festival and in schools throughout the Central Lakes region. The young composer also attends the festival, works with the musicians performing their new piece, and personally presents the performances.

Georgina Palmer is a New Zealand composer, currently studying composition at the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music.

She has been heavily involved in brass bands around New Zealand and Australia, placing with a variety of A-Grade bands at both National Championships.

She has been commissioned by violinist Rakuto Kurano and the National Youth Brass Band of New Zealand. Our first AWE+ free performance features two of Aotearoa's most talented young musicians and AWE's inaugural Fellows: Jack Moyer and Otis Prescott-Mason. Described as 'brimming with potential' on their recent trip to Europe, Jack and Otis join forces to perform Janáček's *Pohádka* (Fairy Tale) which depicts scenes from an epic poem by Vasily Zhukovsky. The piece was written at a difficult time in Janáček's life following the death of his daughter.

John Harbison's *Twilight Music* offers a closer look at the french horn through the eyes of one of the most respected American composers of the 20th century. In Harbison's words, the violin and horn 'share material mainly to show how differently they project it. It is the kind of music I am drawn to, where the surface seems simplest and most familiar, where the piece seems to make no effort, but some purposeful, independent musical argument is at work.'
